Runway 11 at Coal Aston had a dry, grassed surface. The weather was fine and the surface wind was reported as 100°/<5 kt. The aircraft was set up in the final approach configuration, however, the pilot identified the fact that, just prior to touchdown, the airspeed was higher than required. The aircraft, consequently, bounced twice before settling on the runway. The brakes were applied and it came to rest on its nose, the nose landing gear having collapsed. The pilot switched off the magnetos, the electrics master switch and the fuel. Both occupants, who were wearing diagonal upper torso restraint, vacated the aircraft without injury.
