The pilot reports that the landing gear was lowered at 1000 ft whilst on base leg, the gear lowered without hesitation and three greens were observed by all three occupants. The landing was normal, but after approximately 80 yards of the landing run, the nose of the aircraft dropped and the aircraft skidded a further 70 yards, veering slightly to the left. On vacating the aircraft it was noted that the nose wheel had collapsed, but the main wheels were still locked down.

The maintenance organisation carrying out the repairs state that despite a comprehensive check of the landing gear system, no faults were found.
