1. Introduction

The 2014 to 2020 European Structural and Investment Funds bring the European Regional Development Fund, European Social Fund and part of the European Agricultural Fund for Rural Development together into a single European Union Structural and Investment Funds Growth Programme for England supporting the key growth priorities of innovation, research and development, support for Small and Medium sized Enterprises, low carbon, skills, employment, and social inclusion.

The Funds are managed by the Department for Communities and Local Government for European Regional Development Fund, Department for Work and Pensions for European Social Fund and the Department for Environment Food and Rural Affairs for European Agricultural Fund for Rural Development. These Departments are the Managing Authorities for each Fund. In London, the Greater London Authority acts as an Intermediate Body for the European Regional Development Fund and European Social Fund programmes. Unless stated otherwise, the term “Managing Authority” will apply to all these organisations. The Managing Authorities work closely with local partners who provide:

- Practical advice and information to the Managing Authorities to assist in the preparation of local plans that contribute towards Operational Programme priorities and targets;
- Local intelligence to the Managing Authorities in the development of project calls (decided by the Managing Authorities) that reflect Operational Programme and local development needs as well as match funding opportunities; and
- Advice on local economic growth conditions and opportunities within the context of the Operational Programme and the local European Structural Investment Fund Strategy to aid the Managing Authority’s assessments at outline and full application stage.

This call is issued by the Department for Communities and Local Government and invites Outline Applications in respect of the European Regional Development Fund for England 2014 to 2020.

2. Call Context

On behalf of the national Growth Programme Board, the Department for Communities and Local Government (the Managing Authority) invites applications seeking European Regional Development Fund support under:

Priority Axis 4 Supporting the Shift to Low Carbon Economy in All Sectors

Investment Priorities:

- 4a** Promoting the production and distribution of energy derived from renewable resources.
- 4b** Promoting energy efficiency and renewable energy use in enterprises.
- 4f** Promoting research and innovation in, and adoption of, low-carbon technologies.

The European Regional Development Fund Operational Programme for England 2014 to 2020 sets out how the European Regional Development Fund will focus on investment to support economic growth and job creation. **Priority Axis 4** of the Operational Programme aims to move England's economy towards a low carbon model by reducing Greenhouse Gas emissions, increasing the share of renewable energy and enhancing the energy efficiency of homes businesses and transport.

Any application for funding will be required to clearly demonstrate that it meets the requirement of, and makes a meaningful contribution to, the delivery of the relevant Priority Axis of the [European Regional Development Fund Operational Programme](#).

In addition, applications will be expected to meet identified local development need, as expressed in the scope of this call and as set out in the [Sheffield City Region](#) European Structural and Investment Funds Strategy.

Applicants are advised to familiarise themselves with the detail of the Operational Programme, local European Structural and Investment Funds Strategy and the relevant documentation listed in sections 5 through to 8 **prior to** submitting an Outline Application.

3. Scope of the Call

3.1. Scope

This call invites Outline Applications which support the delivery of **Priority Axis 4** of the European Regional Development Fund Operational Programme and responds to

the local development need set out in the [Sheffield City Region](#) **Local Enterprise Partnership Area European Structural and Investment Funds Strategy**.

<p>Indicative Fund Allocation:</p>	<p>Indicatively, through this call the Managing Authority expects to allocate up to £4,000,000. Of which approximately £3,000,000 is made available within South Yorkshire (Transition Region), and £1,000,000 within the rest of Sheffield City Region (More Developed Region). The Managing Authority reserves the right to increase or decrease the indicative allocation, or support more or fewer projects subject to the volume and quality of proposals received.</p> <p>There is no indicative allocation of European Regional Development Fund funding between capital and revenue activity, both capital and revenue is eligible dependent on the nature of activities/Investment Priorities set out in the call.</p>
<p>Minimum application level</p>	<p>European Regional Development Fund investment is intended to make a significant impact on local growth. Applications are expected to demonstrate appropriate scale and impact. The Managing Authority does not intend to allocate less than £500,000 European Regional Development Fund to any single project. Consequently, projects with a total value of less than £1,000,000 will not be supported under this call.</p>
<p>Duration of project approvals</p>	<p>Projects should be for a maximum of three years, however the Managing Authority reserves the right to vary the maximum duration in exceptional circumstances.</p>
<p>Geographical Scope</p>	<p>All interventions are confined to activity and beneficiaries within England.</p> <p>Projects should predominantly support businesses based within Sheffield City Region Local Enterprise Partnership area.</p>
<p>Specific call requirements</p>	<p>DCLG has developed a Priority Axis 4 guidance note for applicants which will be published on the Government's European Structural Investment Fund webpages. Applicants are strongly advised to read the latest guidance in conjunction with developing their proposal(s).</p> <p>Applicants should note that there are two categories of region within the Sheffield City Region Local Enterprise</p>

	<p>Partnership area, with South Yorkshire a ‘transition region’ and North East Derbyshire a ‘more developed region’. Applications covering the Sheffield City Region Local Enterprise Partnership area should therefore apportion costs and outputs for both categories of region, noting contribution rates as per section 6.3.</p> <p>In considering projects received under this call the Managing Authority will take account of the outcome of the first review point on 29th January 2016 and seek advice from the local ESI Funds Sub-Committee.</p> <p>Proposals under this call will need to ensure that they complement and do not duplicate activities to be supported through the Sheffield City Region Growth Hub. Applicants are therefore encouraged to consult with the Local Enterprise Partnership prior to submitting an application.</p>
Call Deadlines	<p>For this specific call, applications will be assessed in batches at set review points. The review points for this call are 29th January 2016 and 31st May 2016. Any applications submitted after the 31st May 2016 will not be assessed. The Department reserves the right to close the call early subject to the response to the first review point.</p>

3.2. Local Development Need

Projects must deliver activity which directly contributes to the objectives of Priority Axis 4 of the Operational Programme, one or more of the relevant Investment Priorities and meet the **local development need** expressed in the table below.

LOCAL DEVELOPMENT NEED
<p>Local Economic Context:</p> <p>The Sheffield City Region European Structural Investment Fund Strategy sets out the opportunities and priorities that will help to create a stronger and bigger private sector that can compete in global and national markets.</p> <p>The city region’s priorities for low carbon development are complementary to this aim. Achieving sustainable development in the city-region, which has an important industrial base, requires urgent action to enhance the resilience of its energy supply and systems, as well as ensuring greater resource efficiency. Businesses in the city-region share the challenge to increase their uptake of low carbon technology, processes and systems, due to a real or perceived ‘choice’ as to whether to invest in these sustainability measures or, alternatively to target investment into other innovations that may also offer to make them more competitive or effective.</p>

A key strength and opportunity in the city-region relates to its strong track record in research. This provides the chance to increase business activity, employment, and productivity by supporting knowledge transfer, commercialisation, inward investment and business formation and growth. Therefore, as well as pursuing reduced Green House Gas outcomes directly through business support for greater resource efficiency and low carbon development, Sheffield City Region is seeking to make a global impact via innovative Research & Development collaborations across sectors, to enhance its position and standing as a renowned centre of excellence in low carbon. This can be achieved via support for innovation networks, demonstration schemes, partnership development and targeted knowledge transfer schemes with clear routes to boost the capacity of Sheffield City Region's private sector for global trade and investment.

The Centre for Low Carbon Futures calculated that the 2011 Sheffield City Region energy bill was £3.41 billion per year, and that this would grow to £4.59 billion by 2022 – a £1.18 billion increase. With the annual GVA output of Sheffield City Region standing at approximately £28bn, energy costs constitute over 10% of economic output; a significant proportion.

Through investment in low carbon energy generation and distribution, Sheffield City Region can make its own contribution to addressing national challenges, namely supporting the UK in meeting the requirements of the Climate Change Act (80% less CO₂ emissions by 2050, compared to 1990 levels), keeping the lights on by addressing the energy generation gap, and achieving greater security over energy supply. Additional benefits include greater control over energy costs, job creation and skills development and the potential to develop a low carbon energy ecosystem that not only generates low carbon electricity, but other products and services such as heat, hydrogen fuel, food and waste processing.

Alongside these opportunities and threats, the city-region has the added issue of a surfeit of brownfield industrial locations and previously developed land associated with manufacturing, mineral and aggregates sites and in some cases, redundant infrastructure associated with earlier uses. Through strategic, landscape scale approaches, place-making and targeted green infrastructure investments, fewer of these locations are now seen as a detractor to future investment. However, the city-region does need to make better, and more efficient use of this land as a resource, and particularly to find more economic uses and outcomes. Low carbon development provides a key opportunity to achieve these dual goals.

Sheffield City Region intends to use the opportunity of ERDF and associated/complementary investment opportunities to help resolve these opportunities and tensions, e.g. to deliver resource-saving options efficiently *alongside* other essential infrastructures and innovations that will help boost growth. Economic development and sustainability are therefore viewed as complementary to one another, due to the opportunities of developing reliable (and more locally derived) sources of renewables, reduced energy prices (and less severe price fluctuations) and, of utmost importance, greater energy/resource efficiency.

In addition to the individual activities set out under each investment priority in section 3.3. **Proposal(s) are sought to provide specialist support and grants**

(potentially in the form of a broker role) to support activities identified under either/or investment Priority 4a and 4b as set out in section 3.3.

Local Priorities:

Proposals should demonstrate alignment with local development need and priorities including:

Under Investment Priority 4a:

Proposals that support the production and distribution of energy derived from renewable sources, to include those indicative actions set out in section 3.3, namely:

- Measures to support increased production of renewable fuels and energy, in particular wind energy, solar and biomass.
- Support to build capability and capacity for supply chains in renewable energy
- Demonstration and deployment of renewable energy technologies
- Measures to support the wider deployment of renewable heat, including micro-generation, geothermal, renewable heat networks or district heating, ground source and air source heat pumps, and biomass systems with associated heat off-take and heat distribution networks along with recycling processing reprocessing and remanufacturing facilities, and
- Anaerobic digestion plants and other biomass or landfill gas schemes.

Under Investment Priority 4b:

Sheffield City Region is particularly keen to support SMEs to invest in, and exploit low carbon and energy efficiency measures, specifically:

- local renewable energy resources;
- SME energy efficiency measures, including, for example, heat reclamation and proposals that incorporate capital support for SME's for equipment to improve their energy efficiency, providing they focus on next phase technologies.
- Low emission / electric vehicles and charging points, subject to ERDF eligibility.
- Low impact urban development and buildings, particularly in urban industrial brownfield locations.
- Support targeted towards SME's that has a demonstrable impact in terms of energy efficiency and climate change mitigation measures. Projects will be required to accurately report GHG reductions (in terms of CO₂e) of businesses' activities as a direct result these interventions.

This Investment Priority is focussed on energy efficiency rather than resource efficiency. Whilst these two aspects of efficiency are mutually reinforcing, they are not the same. Eligible calls and projects under this Investment Priority must therefore only describe energy efficiency measures that fit with the Specific Objective, expected results and indicative activities of this Investment Priority as set out in

section 3.3. **Applicants are strongly advised to refer to the ERDF Priority Axis 4 Low Carbon Guidance Note published on the Government European Structural Investment Funds web-site.**

Under Investment Priority 4f:

Applications are sought for projects that will stimulate, nurture and support collaborative R&D partnerships that demonstrate SME-led innovation, towards the development and delivery of new low carbon and clean-technology products, processes and services. Proposals will be expected to work in tandem with higher education / further education institutions, to deliver knowledge transfer actions, new patents and start-ups and spin-off initiatives, for example through joint ventures.

Proposals are also sought for projects to demonstrate innovation in the development and delivery of transformational renewable energy technologies and novel integrated infrastructure approaches, incorporating new ways to make energy connections, use smart grid technologies and deliver practicable power storage solutions.

Sheffield City Region wishes to boost Innovation in low carbon and resource efficiency. In conjunction with work in other Investment Priority areas, it will encourage support for innovation and establishment of productive joint ventures/partnerships between academia, SMEs and industry, including facilitation of R&D collaborations and establishment of spin-offs. This could entail support for innovative product development, proof of concept, manufacture, testing, demonstration and marketing for specific low carbon technologies or materials, that may include (not exclusively):

- renewables technology development and demonstration;
- low whole-life cycle emission vehicles and components;
- innovative resource efficiency measures, insulation materials and techniques;
- low impact urban development and buildings, particularly in urban industrial brownfield locations.

3.3. Operational Programme Investment Priorities

Applications must specify the activities to be delivered and are expected to directly contribute to **one or more** of the following Investment Priorities:

Investment Priority	4a – Promoting the production and distribution of energy derived from renewable sources.
Specific Objectives	Increase the number of small scale renewable energy schemes in England.

Indicative Actions

The main target group is Small and Medium Sized Enterprises.

Under this investment priority indicative actions to be supported by European Regional Development Fund may include:

- Enhanced advice, support, information and action to promote innovation in businesses and how they operate, in order to deliver best practice in energy management. This will include innovation in energy efficiency and energy cost reduction to improve businesses' competitiveness and resilience
- Support to businesses to undertake 'green' diagnostics or audits of energy efficiency and potential for renewable generation and energy use, which will be followed by provision of energy efficiency information and guidance, tailored energy action plans and of support to implement them
- Investing in energy efficiency measures, processes and renewable generation capacity to improve a business' or building's environmental performance or its resilience to the impacts of climate change
- Investing in measures to stimulate cost-effective deep renovations of buildings, including staged deep renovations
- Supporting an increase in energy efficiency in enterprises including an emphasis on 'whole place' especially through improving industrial processes, designing out waste, recovery of 'waste' heat energy and combined heat and power
- Supporting increased Small and Medium Sized Enterprises access to national and local government procured contracts for energy efficient goods and services
- Developing low carbon innovation in relation to energy efficiency within enterprises, including through technologies and engagement practices
- Building retrofit and energy efficiency measures, especially whole building solutions to exemplify, and support the commercialisation of, next phase technologies which are near to market and low carbon

4. Required Outputs under this Call

Projects must deliver against the Priority Axis 4 outputs and results of the European Regional Development Fund 2014 to 2020 Operational Programme. For projects coming forward under this call the expected outputs and results are:

C1	Number of enterprises receiving support

Applicants will need to demonstrate how the eligible activity, funded by the European Regional Development Fund, will achieve the deliverables committed to within the proposal. The application should clearly state the methodology used to determine the levels of outputs proposed.

All operations will be required to report regularly on progress toward achievement of targets. This will need to include both quantitative and qualitative data relevant to the appropriate geographical areas. Applicants will need to explain how they will collect and record this information to maintain a fully evidenced audit trail. It should

be noted that if an operation fails to deliver contracted deliverables, a performance penalty may apply.

5. Application Process & Prioritisation Methodology

There are two stages to the European Regional Development Fund application process;

- (i) Outline Application and, if successful
- (ii) Full Application.

Acceptance of an Outline Application to progress to full application stage does not in any way indicate or constitute an offer of European Regional Development Fund grant.

Applicants must fully complete the [Outline Application](#) which will be assessed by the Managing Authority against the national [Selection Criteria](#).

Outline Applications will be assessed in two stages, Gateway assessment and Core assessment.

Gateway assessment considers:

- applicant eligibility;
- activity and expenditure eligibility; and
- fit with the National Operational Programme and the local development need set out in section 2.

Proposals that fail the Gateway assessment will be rejected. Proposals which pass the Gateway assessment will then be assessed against the Core assessment criteria:

- Strategic Fit
- Value for money
- Management and control
- Deliverability
- Compliance
 - Procurement
 - State Aid
 - Publicity requirements
- Cross cutting themes
 - Environmental sustainability
 - Equal Opportunities

Having assessed projects against these criteria the relevant Local Economic Partnership Area European Structural and Investment Fund Sub-Committee will

advise the Managing Authority on the alignment to local economic growth conditions and opportunities within the context of the Operational Programme and local European Structural and Investment Fund Strategy to aid the Managing Authority's assessments (at outline and full application stage).

Please note that the Managing Authority's decision is final and there are no appeals. 6. General Information

6.1. National Eligibility Rules

When developing an application, Applicants must refer to the [National Eligibility Rules](#) setting out the requirements of the 2014-2020 European Regional Development Fund Programme. It is the responsibility of the Applicant to ensure that the Rules are adhered to both at application stage and following approval. Failure to do so can lead to financial penalties leading to recovery of up to 100% of grant. Applicants are strongly advised to seek specialist advice if in doubt on any requirement.

European Regional Development Fund eligibility rules apply to **all** project spend within the eligible costs, including match funding.

The European Regional Development Fund is governed by European regulations and national rules. Applicants are advised to familiarise themselves with the relevant documentation, (Section 8 Key Document refers) prior to submitting an Outline Application. If successful, Applicants will enter into a Funding Agreement and must abide by the standard terms and conditions contained therein. Applicants are therefore strongly advised to read these terms and conditions to ensure that they are able to enter into such an agreement prior to responding to the call. Once a Funding Agreement has been issued it should be signed and returned within 30 days, unless otherwise agreed with the Managing Authority.

6.2. Eligible Applicants

Section 4 of the [National Eligibility Rules](#) sets out who is eligible to apply.

Applicants must be legally constituted at the point of signing a Funding Agreement. If the application is approved the Applicant organisation will enter into a legally binding Funding Agreement and therefore will carry the liability for ensuring that the terms and conditions of the Funding Agreement are met.

If there is more than one organisation applying for the funds, a lead organisation must be selected to become the Applicant with the remaining organisation(s) acting as Delivery Partner(s). In this situation the Applicant would be responsible and liable for the Delivery Partner(s) and ensuring the project is operating compliantly.

During the application process the Managing Authority will consider the Applicant's track record, both positive and negative. If the Applicant has been involved in the delivery of previous European grants and any irregularities have been identified, the Managing Authority will expect to see how and what steps have been taken to ensure that the risk of further irregularities in the future is mitigated. It is acknowledged that some organisations will be new to European Structural and Investment Funds funding and will not have a track record.

6.3. Contribution Rate & Match Funding

European Regional Development Fund is normally expected to intervene where no other funding can be obtained (i.e. the funder of last resort). The level of European Regional Development Fund awarded will be the minimum in order for the project to proceed.

The maximum Contribution Rate is 60% of the total eligible project costs subject to State Aid regulations and the category of region where support is to be delivered. The maximum contribution rate within South Yorkshire (Transition Region) is 60%. The maximum contribution rate within the rest of Sheffield City Region (More Developed Region) is 50%.

The remaining 40% (Transition Region) and 50% (More Developed Region) or more must come from other eligible sources as specified under section 6 of the National Eligibility Rules. Applicants will need to demonstrate that they have eligible match funding in place for the balance of costs. Other European Union funds cannot be used as a source of match funding.

European Regional Development Fund investment is limited by State Aid regulations and where the award of European Regional Development Fund would constitute State Aid the European Regional Development Fund grant rate may fall below the 60% maximum.

European Regional Development Fund is paid quarterly in arrears and expenditure must be defrayed prior to the submission of any Grant claims. Applicants may be asked to demonstrate how they are able to cash flow the operation.

6.4. Project Timescales

European Regional Development Fund funding will normally be approved for three years, however the Managing Authority reserves the right to extend the contract term in exceptional circumstances.

Projects approved through this call are expected to:

- Submit a detailed and complete full application within three months of formal selection at outline stage. Projects which fail to meet this deadline may be deselected,
- Commence delivery (defraying European Regional Development Fund eligible costs) within three months of formal approval. Projects which fail to meet this deadline may be deselected, and
- Be completed by June 2023.

6.5. Capital Projects

Applicants seeking European Regional Development Fund to support a capital project (i.e. land and/or property) will need to meet Building Research Establishment Environmental Assessment Method or Civil Engineering Environmental Quality Assessment 'Excellent' for new builds and 'Very Good' for refurbishments.

Applicants will need to provide evidence of how they will achieve the rating required (unless otherwise agreed with the Managing Authority).

Applicants will need to demonstrate that they have the rights and permissions to undertake the project and must provide:

- Proof of current interest in the land and/or property, which includes evidence of the freehold ownership or any lease arrangements that may be in place; and
- Evidence of the approval of any planning permission, or in certain circumstances a clear statement on the process for securing such consents and any risks to the project.

Royal Institute of British Architects Stage D costs must be supplied with the Full Application and be certified by an independent Quantity Surveyor and Land/Property contributions certified by a Real Estate Valuation expert who are current and chartered members of the Royal Institute of Chartered Surveyors/ Chartered Institute of Builders or equivalent body.

Successful Applicants will be required to provide security to the Managing Authority in the form of a Legal Charge and/or Deed of Covenant over the land and/or property. Applicants will be responsible for registering the charge at their own cost.

6.6. Cross Cutting Themes/Horizontal Principles

All applications received under this call should demonstrate how the Cross Cutting Themes have been addressed in the project design and development. Cross Cutting Themes for European Regional Development Fund are 'equality and anti-discrimination' and 'sustainable development'. Further information is available in the [European Regional Development Fund Operational Programme](#).

6.7. Additionality, Duplication and Displacement

Additionality is a core principle of European Regional Development Funding. Applicants must be able to demonstrate that the activity paid for out of European Regional Development Funding adds value to new or existing activity. Projects need to demonstrate that without the support of European Regional Development Funding the activity would not have taken place.

European Regional Development Funding cannot support activities that duplicate existing provision/services within the region.

Applications need to identify and evidence the beneficiaries will use the service and demonstrate that the project does not displace other activity available in the market place.

6.8. State Aid & Revenue Generation

Applicants are required, in the Outline Application, to provide a view on how their proposal complies with State Aid law. Applicants must ensure that projects comply with the law on State Aid.¹ Grant funding to any economic undertaking which is State Aid can only be awarded if it is compatible aid, in that it complies with the terms of a notified scheme or is covered by the De Minimis Regulation. Guidance for Grant Recipients, explaining more about [State Aid](#), is available; it is important that Applicants take responsibility for understanding the importance of the State Aid rules and securing their full compliance with them throughout the project, if it is selected into the Programme.

The Managing Authority is not able to give legal advice on State Aid. It is the responsibility of the Applicant to ensure that the operation is State Aid compliant.

Where the Applicant does not perceive that there is any State Aid, it should state whether or not it considers Articles 61 and 65(8) of regulation 1303/2013 to apply. Article 61 refers to monitoring revenues generated after completion of the project, and Article 65(8) how to deal with differences in the forecast and actual revenues at the end of the operation. This revenue should be taken into account in calculating eligible expenditure. The details of this will be tested at the full application stage.

¹ Article 107(1) of the Treaty on the Functioning of the European Union provides that: "Save as otherwise provided in the Treaties, any aid granted by a Member State or through state resources in any form whatsoever which distorts or threatens to distort competition by favouring certain undertakings or the production of certain goods shall, in so far as it affects trade between Member States, be incompatible with the internal market."

6.9. Funding Agreement

The Funding Agreement is a standard, non-negotiable and legally binding document. Any successful Applicant will be subject to the terms and conditions contained within this agreement. Applicants are strongly advised to seek relevant advice to ensure that they would be able to enter into and abide by the terms of the Funding Agreement.

Applicants are advised that additional provisions and securities may be included within the Funding Agreement to protect the investment. Detailed advice will be given if appropriate at the Full Application stage.

Failure to meet any of the conditions of the Funding Agreement or the commitments within the application will result in claw back of the Grant (which may include interest).

6.10. Procurement

All costs claimed by the Applicant (Grant Recipient and/or Delivery Partner(s)) must be recovered on an actual cost basis. Other costs must be procured in line with National (including [Public Procurement Regulation 2015](#)) and European Union regulations. Procurement will be subject to audit and verification and any irregularity will result in financial penalty of up to 100% of the grant paid. Robust and transparent procurement is required to ensure that Grant Recipients:

- Consider value for money;
- Maximise efficient use of public money; and
- Maintain competitiveness and fairness across the European Union.

It is **strongly recommended** that Applicants seek and follow legal advice in respect of procurement requirements. Procurement irregularities remain the most substantive cause of error and clawback of grant.

The call will close for applications on 31st May 2016. However, the Department reserves the right to close the call early depending on the level of response at the first review point. Any Outline Applications which are not fully completed will be excluded.

For this call applications will normally be required to **commence delivery/activity within three months** of the award of Funding Agreement.
