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1. Introduction

The 2014 to 2020 European Structural and Investment Funds bring the European Regional Development Fund, European Social Fund and part of the European Agricultural Fund for Rural Development together into a single European Union Structural and Investment Funds Growth Programme for England supporting the key growth priorities of innovation, research and development, support for Small and Medium Sized Enterprises, low carbon, skills, employment, and social inclusion.

The Funds are managed by the Department for Communities and Local Government for European Regional Development Fund, Department for Work and Pensions for European Social Fund and the Department for Environment, Food and Rural Affairs for European Agricultural Fund for Rural Development. These Departments are the Managing Authorities for each Fund. In London, the Greater London Authority acts as an Intermediate Body for the European Regional Development Fund and European Social Fund programmes. In some other areas, Intermediate Bodies are being designated by the Department for Communities and Local Government and the Department for Work and Pensions to perform certain tasks:

- Input into project calls in respect of local development needs (with reference to ESI Funds Strategies); and
- Assessment of applications against certain selection criteria in relation to fit with local priorities in respect of the European Regional Development Fund and European Social Fund.

The Managing Authorities and Intermediate Bodies work closely with local partners who provide:

- Practical advice and information to the Managing Authorities to assist in the preparation of local plans that contribute towards Operational Programme priorities and targets;
- Local intelligence to the Managing Authorities (or Intermediate Bodies where designated) in the development of project calls that reflect Operational Programme and local development needs as well as match funding opportunities; and
- Advice on local economic growth conditions and opportunities within the context of the Operational Programme and the local European Structural and Investment Fund Strategy to aid the Managing Authorities' (or Intermediate Bodies where designated) assessments at outline and full application stage.

This call is issued by the Department for Communities and Local Government and invites Outline Applications in respect of the European Regional Development Fund for England 2014 to 2020.

2. Call Context

On behalf of the national Growth Programme Board, the Department for Communities and Local Government (the Managing Authority) invites applications seeking European Regional Development Fund support under:

Priority Axis 1 Promoting Research and Innovation

Investment Priorities:

- 1b** promoting business investment in research and innovation;
- developing links and synergies between enterprises, research and development centres and the Higher Education sector, in particular promoting investment in product and service development, technology transfer, social innovation, eco-innovation, public service applications, demand stimulation, networking, clusters and open innovation through smart specialisation;
- and supporting technological and applied research, pilot lines, early product validation actions, advance manufacturing capabilities and first production, in particular in key enabling technologies and diffusion of general purpose technologies.

The **European Regional Development Fund Operational Programme for England 2014 to 2020** sets out how the European Regional Development Fund will focus on investment to support economic growth and job creation. **Priority Axis 1** of the Operational Programme aims to improve how Small and Medium Sized Enterprises commercialise research and how they collaborate with research institutions.

Any application for funding will be required to clearly demonstrate that it meets the requirement of, and makes a meaningful contribution to, the delivery of the relevant Priority Axis of the [European Regional Development Fund Operational Programme](#).

In addition, applications will be expected to meet identified local development need, as expressed in the scope of this call and as set out in the [North East Local Enterprise Partnership area](#) European Structural and Investment Funds Strategy.

Applicants are advised to familiarise themselves with the detail of the Operational Programme, local European Structural and Investment Funds Strategy and the relevant documentation listed in sections 5 through to 8 **prior to** submitting an Outline Application.

3. Scope of the Call

3.1. Scope

This call invites Outline Applications which support the delivery of **Priority Axis 1** of the European Regional Development Fund Operational Programme and responds to the local development need set out in the [North East Local Enterprise Partnership area](#) **European Structural and Investment Funds Strategy**.

3.2. Local Development Need

Projects must deliver activity which directly contributes to the objectives of Priority Axis 1 of the Operational Programme, one or more of the relevant Investment Priorities and meet the **local development need** expressed in the table below.

LOCAL DEVELOPMENT NEED

Local Economic Context :

The North East has a long history of invention and a pioneering spirit - leading the world in the development of rail passenger travel, engineering and scientific discovery in the Industrial Revolution. Today the North East is leading a new industrial revolution, with strengths that allow the region to stand out from the crowd through 'smart specialisation' areas. The focus will be on what the North East is good at, giving the local economy greater competitive advantage by driving rapid growth and creating more and better jobs.

However, the rationale for this proposed investment derives from the challenge presented by Lord Adonis in the North East Independent Economic Review for the area to become '*an international exemplar in Smart Specialisation, open innovations systems and culture*'. To achieve this, the North East needs to focus on:

- Smart Specialisation, ensuring that innovation is focused on areas where there is existing pedigree and/or research strengths that can form the basis for future competitive advantage. The North East has identified four Smart Specialisation areas: passenger vehicle manufacture; subsea and offshore technology; life sciences and health; and creative, digital, software and technology based services. In addition four cross cutting technologies in surface science (including photonics and materials), ageing and health, satellite applications and energy systems have been identified.
- Building on existing innovation assets, expertise and capability, and market insights with a focus on opportunities for problem solving within and outside the region.
- Facilitation of dialogue through networks involving innovation focused research institutions, incubators, businesses and universities, intended to encourage exchange of best practice and identification of solutions.

Successful innovation regions are characterised by a strong culture of creativity and problem-solving behaviours across the public and private sectors, supported by a pro-active co-ordination of innovation intelligence, dialogue and networking. For individual businesses, successful innovation is a key source of competitive advantage with new products and processes driving opportunities for new markets or efficient delivery.

For areas such as the North East, dynamic innovation systems and cultures can be the source of both economic and social development – the growth and creativity of individual businesses drives new investment and employment, and socially focused innovation responds to the changing demands of communities. This is essential for areas like the North East, which trades globally and needs its businesses to be competitive by constantly innovating and staying ahead of the game.

At face value, the North East Local Enterprise Partnership area has a long way to go to meet these aspirations. Universities, as creators of research and knowledge, form

an integral part of this system and are currently the major undertakers of research in the area. However, in practice there are barriers which inhibit the on-going engagement of universities which restrict the translation of this research into practical outcomes. In absolute terms today, the North East's performance in turning ideas into economic value through research and development (R&D) is not competitive. In their 2008 review, the Organisation for Economic Co-operation and Development (OECD) found that the North East was 'below average' against most key metrics compared nationally and internationally. Across six key measures, even in the strongest performing measure of higher education R&D investment, the area was about average. But the North East was characterised by low levels of government and business R&D where the area ranked towards the bottom. Subsequent Office for National Statistics (ONS), European Union (EU) and Higher Education Funding Council for Education (HEFCE) data has confirmed this pattern. In 2010, R&D expenditure here was £536m (1.31% of GVA). R&D spend per business is higher in the North East than Yorkshire and Humber and London, but these four lag any other part of the England by a significant margin. In 2011, 380 patent applications were sought, with 70 granted (14%). These figures are amongst the lowest in the UK. In summary the North East faces a number of innovation challenges:

- Low level of corporate, SME and broader public sector innovation;
- Poor innovation profile and brand equity;
- Network fragmentation;
- Lack of innovation skills;
- Poor co-ordination and communications.

In response, the North East European Structural and Investment Funds Strategy seeks to drive a focus on smart specialisation and open innovation by addressing:

- The need for greater collaboration in research between enterprises, research institutions, (including Catapults) and public institutions;
- The need to enable new products and business processes to be brought to market, particularly related to smart specialisation and related areas including those linked to 'key enabling' and the 'eight great' technologies;

This call for proposals is focussed exclusively on the Transition area, County Durham, of the North East LEP area. It will provide a catalyst for innovation and will enable businesses and other innovation players to substantially build on their existing activity across County Durham through extra investment to build capability and capacity.

County Durham sits in the heart of the North East of England, an outward facing region with a proud history of exporting and advanced manufacturing. The County is an ideal location for business with good north/south transport links and ready access to local, regional and international markets.

There is growing confidence in the region and in County Durham too with notable

inward investments in financial, manufacturing and tourism sectors combined with company expansions and growth in education and health care sectors. The County has many assets in its people, places and business stock which can be utilised to improve economic performance.

County Durham has a significant role to play in the ambition of the ESIF Strategy with a number of major economic assets, a diverse business base and a population of over 515,000 including talented young people, a skilled workforce and innovative business leaders.

Projects which address the smart specialisation sectors and open innovation are particularly encouraged, **with a particular priority being revenue-based interventions** that build on innovation assets and enabling novel approaches to major societal changes.

The outcome of this, and other innovation calls will be a contribution to increased R&D investment in the UK, which amounted to 1.77% of the GDP in 2010, slightly below the EU average. Increasing the % of the R&D investment is a specific recommendation of the European Commission to the UK. The 2020 Target at European level is 3%.

Local Priorities:

The North East Local Enterprise Partnership area includes both 'more developed' (Northumberland, Tyne and Wear) and 'transition' (County Durham) categories of region.

Proposal should demonstrate alignment with local development need and priorities in County Durham. Priority will focus on revenue interventions which align with, develop and grow the North East LEP area smart specialisation sectors, in particular:

- Supporting SMEs with early stage high risk innovation projects by building capacity to take forward ideas especially linked to solving societal problems.
- Initiatives which facilitate and promote SMEs engagement in innovation by diversifying into different sectors or markets. Building on Durham's developing local priorities in the space and satellites applications sector, tackling the healthcare causes and consequences of social isolation, surface science (particularly formulations and integrating novel materials into high value products), light-based technologies, smart and open data, financial technology.
- Ensuring that companies are supported and networked appropriately to bring new products to market, aligning with existing provision in the North East Growth Hub, NETPark, the North East Innovation Supernetwork and NETPark Net.

This call is for projects in the Transition Category of Region of County Durham only.

3.3. Operational Programme Investment Priorities

Applications must specify the activities to be delivered and are expected to directly contribute to Investment Priority 1b only:

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4. Required Outputs under this Call

Projects must deliver against the Priority Axis 1 outputs of the European Regional Development Fund 2014 to 2020 Operational Programme. For projects coming forward under this call the expected outputs and results are:

Applicants will need to demonstrate how the eligible activity, funded by the European Regional Development Fund, will achieve the outputs committed to within the proposal. The application should clearly state the methodology used to determine the levels of outputs proposed.

All operations will be required to report regularly on progress toward achievement of targets. This will need to include both quantitative and qualitative data relevant to the appropriate geographical areas. Applicants will need to explain how they will collect and record this information to maintain a fully evidenced audit trail. It should

be noted that if an operation fails to deliver contracted outputs, a performance penalty may apply.

5. Application Process & Prioritisation Methodology

There are two stages to the European Regional Development Fund application process;

- (i) Outline Application and, if successful
- (ii) Full Application.

Acceptance of an Outline Application to progress to full application stage does not in any way indicate or constitute an offer of European Regional Development Fund grant.

Applicants must fully complete the [Outline Application](#) which will be assessed by the Managing Authority against all of the national [Selection Criteria](#) except where an Intermediate Body has been designated to assess against some of the selection criteria. Where an Intermediate Body has been designated to undertake delegated tasks, the Intermediate Body will undertake the assessment against those selection criteria in relation to fit with local priorities.

Outline Applications will be assessed in two stages, Gateway assessment and Core assessment.

The Gateway assessment is undertaken by the Managing Authorities and considers:

- applicant eligibility;
- activity and expenditure eligibility; and
- fit with the National Operational Programme and the local development need set out in section 2.

Applications that fail the Gateway assessment undertaken by the Managing Authority will be rejected. Applications which pass the Gateway assessment will then be assessed by the Managing Authority in relation to all Core assessment criteria.

In areas where an Intermediate Body has been designated, the following will apply:

The Intermediate Body will assess the application against the following Core assessment criteria:

- Local Strategic Fit

The Managing Authority will assess the application against the following Core assessment criteria:

- National Strategic Fit

- Value for money
- Management and control
- Deliverability
- Compliance
 - Procurement
 - State Aid
 - Publicity requirements
- Cross cutting themes
 - Environmental sustainability
 - Equal Opportunities

The Intermediate Body will also provide advice to the Managing Authority to assist the Managing Authority to make its assessment against the following Core selection criteria:

- Value for money
- Deliverability

Having assessed projects against these criteria the relevant Local Economic Partnership area European Structural and Investment Fund Sub-Committee will advise the Managing Authority or Intermediate Body as relevant on the contribution to local economic growth conditions and opportunities within the context of the Operational Programme and local European Structural and Investment Fund Strategy to aid the Managing Authority's assessments (at outline and full application stage).

Having concluded their assessments the Managing Authority and the Intermediate Body will prioritise the applications they wish to proceed based on their assessment against their respective selection criteria. Only projects that the Managing Authority and the Intermediate Body each agree should proceed, based on their respective core selection criteria, will be invited to submit a full application. Subsequently only those full applications that the Managing Authority and the Intermediate Body each agree should proceed, based on their respective selection criteria, will be approved.

Please note that the Managing Authority's decision is final and there are no appeals. 6. General Information

6.1. National Eligibility Rules

When developing an application, Applicants must refer to the [National Eligibility Rules](#) setting out the requirements of the 2014-2020 European Regional Development Fund Programme. It is the responsibility of the Applicant to ensure that the Rules are adhered to both at application stage and following approval. Failure to do so can lead to financial penalties leading to recovery of up to 100% of grant. Applicants are strongly advised to seek specialist advice if in doubt on any requirement.

European Regional Development Fund eligibility rules apply to **all** project spend within the eligible costs, including match funding.

The European Regional Development Fund is governed by European regulations and national rules. Applicants are advised to familiarise themselves with the relevant documentation, (Section 8 Key Document refers) prior to submitting an Outline Application. If successful, Applicants will enter into a Funding Agreement and must abide by the standard terms and conditions contained therein. Applicants are therefore strongly advised to read these terms and conditions to ensure that they are able to enter into such an agreement prior to responding to the call. Once a Funding Agreement has been issued it should be signed and returned within 30 days, unless otherwise agreed with the Managing Authority.

6.2. Eligible Applicants

Section 4 of the [National Eligibility Rules](#) sets out who is eligible to apply.

Applicants must be legally constituted at the point of signing a Funding Agreement. If the application is approved the Applicant organisation will enter into a legally binding Funding Agreement and therefore will carry the liability for ensuring that the terms and conditions of the Funding Agreement are met.

If there is more than one organisation applying for the funds, a lead organisation must be selected to become the Applicant with the remaining organisation(s) acting as Delivery Partner(s). In this situation the Applicant would be responsible and liable for the Delivery Partner(s) and ensuring the project is operating compliantly.

During the application process the Managing Authority will consider the Applicant's track record, both positive and negative. If the Applicant has been involved in the delivery of previous European grants and any irregularities have been identified, the Managing Authority will expect to see how and what steps have been taken to

ensure that the risk of further irregularities in the future is mitigated. It is acknowledged that some organisations will be new to European Structural and Investment Funds funding and will not have a track record.

6.3. Contribution Rate & Match Funding

European Regional Development Fund is normally expected to intervene where no other funding can be obtained (i.e. the funder of last resort). The level of European Regional Development Fund awarded will be the minimum in order for the project to proceed.

The maximum Contribution Rate is 60% in the Transition area (County Durham) of the total eligible project costs subject to State Aid regulations.

The remaining 40% or more must come from other eligible sources as specified under section 6 of the National Eligibility Rules. Applicants will need to demonstrate that they have eligible match funding in place for the balance of costs. Other European Union funds cannot be used as a source of match funding.

European Regional Development Fund investment is limited by State Aid regulations and where the award of European Regional Development Fund would constitute State Aid the European Regional Development Fund grant rate may fall below the 60% maximum.

European Regional Development Fund is paid quarterly in arrears and expenditure must be defrayed prior to the submission of any Grant claims. Applicants may be asked to demonstrate how they are able to cash flow the operation.

6.4. Project Timescales

European Regional Development Fund funding will normally be approved for three years, however the Managing Authority reserves the right to extend the contract term in exceptional circumstances.

Projects approved through this call are expected to:

- Submit a detailed and complete full application within three months of formal selection at outline stage. Projects which fail to meet this deadline may be deselected,
- Commence delivery (defraying European Regional Development Fund eligible costs) within three months of formal approval. Projects which fail to meet this deadline may be deselected, and
- Be completed by June 2023.

6.5. Capital Projects

Applicants seeking European Regional Development Fund to support a capital project (i.e. land and/or property) will need to meet Building Research Establishment Environmental Assessment Method or Civil Engineering Environmental Quality Assessment 'Excellent' for new builds and 'Very Good' for refurbishments.

Applicants will need to provide evidence of how they will achieve the rating required (unless otherwise agreed with the Managing Authority).

Applicants will need to demonstrate that they have the rights and permissions to undertake the project and must provide:

- Proof of current interest in the land and/or property, which includes evidence of the freehold ownership or any lease arrangements that may be in place; and
- Evidence of the approval of any planning permission, or in certain circumstances a clear statement on the process for securing such consents and any risks to the project.

Royal Institute of British Architects Stage D costs must be supplied with the Full Application and be certified by an independent Quantity Surveyor and Land/Property contributions certified by a Real Estate Valuation expert who are current and chartered members of the Royal Institute of Chartered Surveyors/ Chartered Institute of Builders or equivalent body.

Successful Applicants will be required to provide security to the Managing Authority in the form of a Legal Charge and/or Deed of Covenant over the land and/or property. Applicants will be responsible for registering the charge at their own cost.

6.6. Cross Cutting Themes/Horizontal Principles

All applications received under this call should demonstrate how the Cross Cutting Themes have been addressed in the project design and development. Cross Cutting Themes for European Regional Development Fund are 'equality and anti-discrimination' and 'sustainable development'. Further information is available in the [European Regional Development Fund Operational Programme](#).

6.7. Additionality, Duplication and Displacement

Additionality is a core principle of European Regional Development Funding.

Applicants must be able to demonstrate that the activity paid for out of European Regional Development Funding adds value to new or existing activity. Projects need to demonstrate that without the support of European Regional Development Funding the activity would not have taken place.

European Regional Development Funding cannot support activities that duplicate existing provision/services within the region.

Applications need to identify and evidence how the beneficiaries will use the service and demonstrate that the project does not displace other activity available in the market place.

6.8. State Aid & Revenue Generation

Applicants are required, in the Outline Application, to provide a view on how their proposal complies with State Aid law. Applicants must ensure that projects comply with the law on State Aid.¹ Grant funding to any economic undertaking which is State Aid can only be awarded if it is compatible aid, in that it complies with the terms of a notified scheme or is covered by the De Minimis Regulation. Guidance for Grant Recipients, explaining more about [State Aid](#), is available; it is important that Applicants take responsibility for understanding the importance of the State Aid rules and securing their full compliance with them throughout the project, if it is selected into the Programme.

The Managing Authority is not able to give legal advice on State Aid. It is the responsibility of the Applicant to ensure that the operation is State Aid compliant.

Where the Applicant does not perceive that there is any State Aid, it should state whether or not it considers Articles 61 and 65(8) of regulation 1303/2013 to apply. Article 61 refers to monitoring revenues generated after completion of the project, and Article 65(8) how to deal with differences in the forecast and actual revenues at the end of the operation. This revenue should be taken into account in calculating eligible expenditure. The details of this will be tested at the full application stage.

6.9. Funding Agreement

The Funding Agreement is a standard, non-negotiable and legally binding document. Any successful Applicant will be subject to the terms and conditions contained within this agreement. Applicants are strongly advised to seek relevant advice to ensure that they would be able to enter into and abide by the terms of the Funding Agreement.

¹ Article 107(1) of the Treaty on the Functioning of the European Union provides that: "Save as otherwise provided in the Treaties, any aid granted by a Member State or through state resources in any form whatsoever which distorts or threatens to distort competition by favouring certain undertakings or the production of certain goods shall, in so far as it affects trade between Member States, be incompatible with the internal market."

Applicants are advised that additional provisions and securities may be included within the Funding Agreement to protect the investment. Detailed advice will be given if appropriate at the Full Application stage.

Failure to meet any of the conditions of the Funding Agreement or the commitments within the application will result in claw back of the Grant (which may include interest).

6.10. Procurement

All costs claimed by the Applicant (Grant Recipient and/or Delivery Partner(s)) must be recovered on an actual cost basis. Other costs must be procured in line with National (including [Public Procurement Regulation 2015](#)) and European Union regulations. Procurement will be subject to audit and verification and any irregularity will result in financial penalty of up to 100% of the grant paid. Robust and transparent procurement is required to ensure that Grant Recipients:

- Consider value for money;
- Maximise efficient use of public money; and
- Maintain competitiveness and fairness across the European Union.

It is **strongly recommended** that Applicants seek and follow legal advice in respect of procurement requirements. Procurement irregularities remain the most substantive cause of error and clawback of grant.
